

#### ► EXPERIENCING THE 157TH DIOCESAN CONVENTION (Melanie Konoski)


The 157th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Easton was held on March 6th — 8th, 2025 at Christ Church on Kent Island. Fr. Carl Mosley, Deacon Alisha King, Delegates, Marena and Melanie Konoski and Alternates, Birgitt and Rudy Brevard represented the Church of the Holy Spirit. The first day of the convention took place at 5:30pm via Zoom for all Clergy, Delegates and Alternates. All

Delegates were commissioned and several reports were presented.

The second evening of the convention was a Holy Eucharist where Andy Diaz received a commission as the Licensed Lay Pastor for Latino Ministry in the Diocese of Easton and was presented with a Bible/Prayer Book and Stole by The Rt. Reverand Santosh Marray (see picture on front page). The service was followed by a reception at Christ Church in the Parish Hall.

The third and final day of the convention was in-person and began at 8 a.m. with Check-In, then Opening Worship — Morning Prayer at 9 a.m. Bishop Marray called the Convention to order at 9:20 a.m. The usual dispatch of business took place and was topped off by Bishop Marray's final Bishop's Address. He will be retiring in February 2026.





One of the amazing features of Camp Wright is the clear view of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge, just a short boat ride away. There is a circular fire pit at the shoreline to watch the huge cargo ships sailing up and down the Chesapeake. Each summer, from June through August, the camp hosts hundreds of children from the ages of 6 through 16 years of age. The youngest ones may come to the camp daily while the older children will take up residence for a week at a time. There is also a multitude of counselors to oversee every facet of the daily programs and events. Many of the counselors-in-training were once campers themselves. From arts and crafts to swimming in a large in-ground pool to singing by the campfire while roasting marshmallows, there is something for everyone.



Once the tour of Camp Wright ended, everyone came back to Christ Church to resume the business session. There were seven Resolutions for Debate on the agenda; however, since there was not a Clergy Quorum present, we could not vote on the subjects. I would encourage everyone to visit the Diocesan website at DioceseofEaston.org to read the details of each resolution. The 157th Convention will be reconvened on Thursday, March 27, 2025, at 5:30 p.m. to vote on each resolution.



The Church of the Holy Spirit proudly shares the following scholarship information with YOU:

#### **SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE TO YOU!**

The **Children's Home Foundation (CHF)** is a diocesan-wide effort to provide need-based funds for local students wishing to pursue technical, job or career training. The mission is to support and encourage those students seeking skills that will lead them directly into the work force.

The **Children's Home Foundation** grants **scholarships and camperships** to students specifically on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. These scholarships go towards career and vocational training. Students attend local 2-year community college or accredited certificate programs. CHF does not grant funding to 4-year colleges. Younger children are eligible for CHF's camperships. Various YMCA camps, church-affiliated camps, and local community center camps are some of the eligible programs CHF grants funding to.

#### TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Traditional scholarships are awarded to graduating high school seniors. Applications are accepted in the spring of the student's senior year and awards are granted in April and May.

#### **NON-TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS**

Non-traditional scholarship applications are accepted on a rolling basis throughout the year. These students are post-graduates looking to enhance their employment opportunities through skills training. Currently, the **Children's Home Foundation** vocational scholarships are administered by the 2-year colleges on Maryland's Eastern Shore: Cecil County and Wor-Wic Community Colleges as well as Chesapeake College.

#### QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (Melanie S. Konoski)

Are you aware of the option to donate to the Church of the Holy Spirit as a Qualified Charitable Distribution?

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a distribution from your individual retirement account (IRA) to a qualified charity.
You must be age 70½ or older to make a qualified charitable distribution, which is not taxed and does not get included in your taxable income.

If you qualify, QCDs can also count toward your required minimum distribution (RMD) that anyone age 73 or older must meet each year if they have a traditional IRA. Also important: You don't have to itemize on your tax return to take advantage of a QCD.

To see if you meet the qualifications to process a QCD, please contact your tax preparer or your financial advisor. This may be a good opportunity for you to satisfy your pledge or make a one-time donation to benefit you and the church.

#### THE NEW SEVEN WONDERS OF THE WORLD:

#### ►2. CHICHÉN ITZÁ

Chichén Itzá, is a ruined ancient Maya city occupying an area of 4 square miles (10 square km) in south-central Yucatán state, Mexico. It is thought to have been a religious, military, political, and commercial center that at its peak would have been home to 35,000 people. The site first saw settlers in 550, probably drawn there because of the easy access to water in the region via caves and sinkholes in limestone formations, known as cenotes.



Chichén Itzá is located some 90 miles (150 km) east-northeast of Uxmal and 75 miles (120 km) east-southeast of the modern city of Mérida. The only source of water in the arid region around the site is from the cenotes. Two big cenotes on the site made it a suitable place for the city and gave it its name, from chi ("mouths"), chen ("wells"), and Itzá, the name of the Maya tribe that settled there. Chichén Itzá was designated a UNESCO World Heritage site in 1988.

Chichén Itzá was founded about the 6th century CE, presumably by Maya peoples of the Yucatán Peninsula who had occupied the region since the Pre-Classic, or Formative, Period (1500 BCE-300 CE). The principal early buildings are in an architectural style known as Puuc, which shows a number of divergences from the styles of the southern lowlands. These earliest structures are to the south of the Main Plaza and include the Akabtzib ("House of the Dark Writing"), the Chichanchob ("Red House"), the Iglesia ("Church"), the Casa de las Monjas ("Nunnery"), and the observatory El Caracol ("The Snail"). There is evidence that, in the 10th century, after the collapse of the Maya cities of the southern lowlands, Chichén Itzá was invaded by foreigners, probably Maya speakers who had been strongly influenced by—and perhaps were under the direction of—the Toltec of central Mexico. These invaders may have been the Itzá for whom the site is named; some authorities, however, believe the Itzá arrived 200 to 300 years later.

In any event, the invaders were responsible for the construction of such major buildings as El Castillo ("The Castle"), a pyramid that rises 79 feet (24 meters) above the Main Plaza.









El Castillo has four sides, each with 91 stairs and facing a cardinal direction; including the step on the top platform, these combine for a total of 365 steps—the number of days in the solar year. During the spring and autumnal equinoxes, shadows cast by the setting sun give the appearance of a snake undulating down the stairways. A carving of a plumed serpent at the top of the pyramid is symbolic of Quetzalcóatl (known to the Maya as Kukulcán), one of the major deities of the ancient Mesoamerican pantheon. Excavations within the nine-platform pyramid revealed another, earlier structure containing a red jaguar throne studded with jade.


The ball court (for playing the game tlachtli [Mayan: pok-ta-pok]) is 545 feet (166 meters) long and 223 feet (68 meters) wide, the largest such court in the Americas. Six sculpted reliefs run the length of the walls of the court, apparently depicting the victors of the game holding the severed head of a member of the losing team. On the upper platform at one end of the court stands the Temple of the Jaguars, inside of which is a mural showing warriors laying siege to a village. Standing on the platform of the temple to the north of the court, it is possible to hear a whisper from 150 feet (46 meters) away.

A legendary tradition at Chichén Itzá was the Cult of the Cenote, involving human sacrifice to the rain god, Chaac, in which victims were thrown into the city's major cenote (at the northernmost part of the ruin), along with gold and jade ornaments and other valuables. In 1904 Edward Herbert Thompson, an American who had bought the entire site, began dredging the cenote; his discovery of skeletons and sacrificial objects confirmed the legend.
