

"SLICE" PARKING AT THE CHURCH OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Church has entered into an agreement with SLICE Parking to use our parking lot to generate income for the church.

As part of this project, signs were installed to designate "No Parking" spaces (4 in front of the kitchen and 2 next to the dumpster.) Additionally, signs were installed to identify the lot as a "pay to park" lot.

These signs do not apply to parishioners and guests coming to the church for services or any other business, or any organizations using the facility for meetings.

SLICE will be managing payments and depositing income to a new bank account set up for this specific purpose. The Church is responsible for monitoring the lot for compliance, so parishioners, guests, and organizations using the facility need not worry about parking without paying!

The Church of the Holy Spirit proudly shares the following scholarship information with YOU:

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE TO YOU!

The **Children's Home Foundation (CHF)** is a diocesan-wide effort to provide need-based funds for local students wishing to pursue technical, job or career training. The mission is to support and encourage those students seeking skills that will lead them directly into the work force.

The **Children's Home Foundation** grants **scholarships and camperships** to students specifically on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. These scholarships go towards career and vocational training. Students attend local 2-year community colleges or accredited certificate programs. CHF does not grant funding to 4-year colleges. Younger children are eligible for CHF's camperships. Various YMCA camps, church-affiliated camps, and local community center camps are some of the eligible programs CHF grants funding to.

TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Traditional scholarships are awarded to graduating high school seniors. Applications are accepted in the spring of the student's senior year and awards are granted in April and May.

NON-TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Non-traditional scholarship applications are accepted on a rolling basis throughout the year. These students are post-graduates looking to enhance their employment opportunities through skills training. Currently, the **Children's Home Foundation** vocational scholarships are administered by the 2-year colleges on Maryland's Eastern Shore: Cecil County and Wor-Wic Community Colleges as well as Chesapeake College.



QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (Melanie S. Konoski)

Are you aware of the option to donate to the Church of the Holy Spirit as a Qualified Charitable Distribution?

A gualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a distribution from your individual retirement account (IRA) to a gualified charity. You must be age 70½ or older to make a qualified charitable distribution, which is not taxed and does not get included in your taxable income.

If you qualify, QCDs can also count toward your required minimum distribution (RMD) that anyone age 73 or older must meet each year if they have a traditional IRA. Also important: You don't have to itemize on your tax return to take advantage of a QCD.

To see if you meet the qualifications to process a QCD, please contact your tax preparer or your financial advisor. This may be a good opportunity for you to satisfy your pledge or make a one-time donation to benefit you and the church.

► 3. PETRA

Petra is a historic and archaeological city in southern Jordan. Famous for its rock-cut architecture and water conduit systems, Petra is also called the "Rose City" because of the colour of the sandstone from which it is carved. The city is one of the New 7 Wonders of the World and a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

The area around Petra has been inhabited from as early as 7000 BC, and was settled by the Nabataeans, a nomadic Arab people, in the 4th century BC. Pe-

tra would later become the capital city of the Nabataean Kingdom in the second century BC. The Nabataeans invested in Petra's proximity to the incense trade routes by establishing it as a major regional trading hub, which gained them considerable revenue. Unlike their enemies, the Nabataeans were accustomed to living in the barren deserts and thus were able to defend their kingdom. They were particularly skillful in agriculture, stone carving, and rainwater harvesting.

Petra flourished in the 1st century AD, when its Al-Khazneh structure, possibly the mausoleum of Nabataean king Aretas IV, was constructed, and its population peaked at an estimated 20,000 inhabitants. Nabataea fell to the Romans in 106 AD, who annexed and renamed it Arabia Petraea. Petra's importance declined as sea trade routes emerged, and after an earthquake in 363 destroyed many structures. In the Byzantine era, several Christian churches were

built, but the city continued to decline and, by the early Islamic era, it was abandoned except for a handful of nomads. It remained unknown to the western world until 1812, when Swiss traveller Johann Ludwig Burckhardt rediscovered it.

UNESCO has described Petra as "one of the most precious cultural properties of man's cultural heritage". Petra is a symbol of Jordan, as well as Jordan's most-visited tourist attraction. Visitor numbers reach close to a million tourists every year.

HISTORY

NEOLITHIC

By 7000 BC, some of the earliest recorded farmers had settled in Beidha, a Pre-Pottery Neolithic settlement just north of Petra.


BRONZE AGE

IRON AGE EDOM

The Iron Age lasted between 1200 and 600 BC; in that time, the Petra area was occupied by the Edomites. The configuration of mountains in Petra allowed for a reservoir of water for the Edomites. This made Petra a stopping ground for merchants, making it an outstanding area for trade. Things that were traded here included wines, olive oil, and wood.

Initially, the Edomites were accompanied by Nomads who eventually left, but the Edomites stayed and made their mark on Petra before the emergence of the Nabataens. It is said that 10,000 men were thrown off of the mountain Umm el-Biyara, but this story has been debated by scholars.

The Edomite site excavated at the top of the Umm el-Biyara mountain at Petra was established no earlier than the seventh century BC (Iron II).



EMERGENCE OF PETRA

The Nabataeans were one among several nomadic Bedouin tribes


that roamed the Arabian Desert and moved with their herds to wherever they could find pasture and water. Although the Nabataeans were initially embedded in Aramaic culture, theories about them having Aramean roots are rejected by many modern scholars. Instead, archaeological, religious and linguistic evidence confirm that they are a northern Arabian tribe. Current evidence suggests that the Nabataean name for Petra was Raqēmō, variously spelled in inscriptions as rqmw or rqm.

The Jewish historian Josephus (ca. 37–100 AD) writes that the region was inhabited by the Midianites during the time of Moses, and that they were ruled by five kings, one of whom was Rekem. Josephus mentions that the city, called Petra by the Greeks, "ranks highest in the land of the Arabs" and was still called Rekeme by all the Arabs of his time, after its royal founder (Antiquities iv. 7, 1; 4, 7). The Onomasticon of Eusebius also identified Rekem as Petra. Arabic raqama means "to mark, to decorate", so Rekeme could be a Nabataean word referring to the famous carved rock façades. In 1964, workmen clearing rubble away from the cliff at the entrance to the gorge found several funerary inscriptions in Nabatean script. One of them was to a certain Petraios who was born in Raqmu (Rekem) and buried in Garshu (Jerash).

An old theory held that Petra might be identified with a place called sela in the Hebrew Bible. Encyclopædia Britannica (1911) states that the Semitic name of the city, if not Sela, would remain unknown. It nevertheless cautioned that sela simply means "rock" in Hebrew, and thence might not be identified with a city where it occurs in the biblical text in the book of Obadiah. It is possible that the city was part of the nation of Edom.

The passage in Diodorus Siculus (xix. 94–97) which describes the expeditions which Antigonus sent against the Nabataeans in 312 BC, was understood by some researchers to throw some light upon the history of Petra, but the "petra" (Greek for rock) referred to as a natural fortress and place of refuge cannot be a proper name, and the description implies that there was no town in existence there at the time.
